
Can you spot the donkey pool float in this colourful scene?

## Clevedon Pier – the 150 year old soul of the town.

In 1869 crowds flocked to Clevedon to witness the opening of its pier. For decades it enjoyed a period of decadence, offering a seaside escape to thousands of visitors. But a century later it succumbed to dwindling numbers and decay, eventually collapsing into the Bristol Channel. The fact it has survived to see its 150th birthday is down to its diehard supporters.



"Architecturally, it's stunning; I'm magnetised to it," says Amy Horner-Webb, whose fondness for the Victorian structure has seen her tattoo its likeness on her leg. The 28-year-old's childhood is peppered with memories of trips to the town's shoreline, the pier looming large in the background. It reminds me of being a kid, family days out and playing with my family there in the sun. "It wouldn't be Clevedon without the pier. And for it to survive for 150 years - not many towns have that."

Or argue that donkey rides are fun and donkeys are well cared for.




Make a picnic together to eat at the beach. Cut sandwiches into halves and quarters. Share the food equally.
